Course Description:

This course examines the progression of development in the physical, cognitive, social, and emotional domains and identifies developmental milestones for children from conception through adolescence. Emphasis on interactions between biological processes and environmental factors. Students will observe children, evaluate individual differences, and analyze characteristics of development at various stages according to developmental theories.

• Please take into account that this is a six-week summer course, which means that lectures and course work will occur at an accelerated rate in comparison to a normal eighteen-week course.

Course Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- Summarize major theories of child development.
- Describe the impact of multiple factors on development and wellbeing, including those related to biology, environment,
- and social interactions.
- Identify the typical progression of development across all domains.
- Differentiate between characteristics of typical and atypical development.
- Apply objective techniques and skills when observing, interviewing, describing, and evaluating behavior in children.

Course Assignments:

During the course of six-week instruction, the student will complete the following:

- Virtual In-Class Activities: Virtual In-class activities will be given throughout the course. Examples of these assignments, such as Flipgrids. Each virtual class assignment will have a small point value [SLO #1 - #3].
- Weekly Participation: You are expected to log in each week for this course and participate in discussions and complete any assigned materials. This counts towards your attendance for this course [SLO #1- #3].
- Quizzes: There will be a short quiz at the end of most learning modules. These will include information from the recorded lectures and assigned readings [SLO # 1 #3].

• Observational Study: Students will have an observational study that require careful analyzation of one development stage discussed in the course: infancy & toddlerhood, early childhood, middle childhood, or adolescence [SLO # 1 – #2].

Course Policies:

- Students are expected to attend and actively participate in class discussions and activities, including virtual sections for this course.
- Students are expected to conduct themselves, according to the student conduct standards outlined in the Reedley College Handbook.
- Students are expected to be respectful of fellow students and the instructor at all times.

- Students are expected to come to class prepared and ready for the day.

- All assignments are to be typed unless otherwise specified by the instructor.
- All assignments must be neat and clearly labeled with student name, date, title of the assignment, and class day/time.
- Papers should be double-spaced, 12-point times new roman font, spelling and grammar checked, one-inch margins in an easy to read font.
- Always save a copy of your work.
- Take responsibility to present completed, polished college level work on-time.
- Late Assignments:

• For this course, assignments are due (unless otherwise specified) every Sunday by 11:59pm. Assignments are assigned well in advance and must be submitted on time; however, life happens and as a result the student may be unable to complete an assignment by the scheduled due date. For this reason, students are allowed to use TWO Late Assignment Passes during the six-week course. If you know you will be unable to turn in your work by the due date, you must contact the instructor immediately so we can work out a reasonable due date. After two late assignments, I will no longer accept late work.

Course Work Expectations:

Proper writing is a basic expectation when someone has earned a college degree and writing quality does matter as a college student and in the profession as an early educator. All assignments completed in this class are expected to have college level quality writing which includes proper use of grammar, usage, mechanics, style, as well as proper APA citing style where applicable.

- American Psychological Association (APA)
 - In this course you will be using American Psychological Association (APA) formatting for all assignments (unless otherwise specified). If you are unfamiliar this this type of formatting, I strongly suggest that you utilize campus resources to ensure academic success. Please see the "Campus Resources" section towards the end of the syllabus for additional information.

Course Communication Policy:

It is important for instructors and students to maintain clear and concise communication throughout the duration of this course. This is especially true for online courses. In our course, you will have two options to communicate with me, depending what your preference is:
