Description

ESL 214LS is a listening and speaking course for ESL students who want to develop oral language skills at the high-intermediate level. Students learn to comprehend authentic lectures, talks, and reports and effectively express ideas and points of view in spoken English on a variety of common academic topics. This course may be taken concurrently with other ESL 214-level courses. Successful completion of this course will prepare students for ESL 215LS or ESL 315LS. ADVISORIES: ESL 213LS or ESL 313LS, or placement through a multiple-measure process.

- 4. identify and use near native-like rhythm, intonation, and stress patterns in words and sentences.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. listen and understand spoken academic English at the high-intermediate level.
- 2. communicate orally on academic topics at the high-intermediate level.
