<u>Final exam</u>: Participation in performances

Course Description

Standard orchestral literature of all periods and styles will be read, studied, and performed. Participants will develop orchestral skills and techniques. Standard as well as some neglected repertoire for symphony orchestra ranging from the Baroque period to the twenty-first century will be explored and performed in public concerts. Skills such as leading a section, blending and supporting within a section, exploration of tonal colors and possibilities, ensemble development, solo opportunities, style considerations, social skills, and stage presence and aspects of the performing experience will be developed by all participants. Participation in performances is required.

Prerequisites

Students must read music and be proficient on an orchestral instrument.

Course Objectives

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. Discuss the correct musical style that is necessary for each piece of music that is studied.
- 2. Discuss biographical and historical information about the composers and the music that is studied.
- 3. Drill on the various rhythmic figures necessary to perform the music that is studied.
- 4. Learn to play simple melodies and scales in several different major and minor keys.
- 5. Review and practice the fingerings/positions necessary to perform the music that is studied.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will:

- 1. Have a successful end of the semester public performance
- 2. Perform orchestral music in a variety of styles, representing several different historical eras through application of music theory, music history, and technical styles and aesthetics
- 3. Improve their technical and musical abilities and sight-reading skills
- 4. Improve their ensemble work skills
- 5. Enlarge their repertoire for symphony orchestra

Appropriate musical instrument (some instruments are available for loan)

Musical literature supplied by the instructor to be returned at the end of the semester

Rehearsal Etiquette

The following will help us have efficient rehearsals.

- 1. Having a full ensemble in attendance When players are missing it is difficult to rehearse.
- 2. Beginning and ending on time- Please arrive early enough to be ready to play by 7:00 and return promptly from the break.
- 3. Minimizing talking and distractions- If you must talk to your section to clarify something in the music, please do it quietly.
- 4. Being prepared for rehearsal- Ensure you have all music and materials prior to the start of rehearsal. If you have a challenging passage in your music, please practice it before the next rehearsal.
- 5. Retaining what we rehearse- Write reminders in your music and review between rehearsals so we don't have to rehearse the same things each time.

Concert Attire

The following attire is required for performances so the ensemble has a uniform and professional appearance:

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Black suit (black dress pants, white dress shirt, black tie, black suit jacket)

OR

Black dress

OR

Black dress pants/skirt with black blouse

AND

Black socks or stockings, black dress shoes
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Skirts and dresses should cover the knees when seated. No sleeveless tops.
