Course Description

Intermediate/advanced-level musical performance instruction in a group setting with concurrent private instruction. Progressive development of skills and knowledge needed for solo performance, auditions, and transfer. Achievement evaluated through a juried performance. Recital participation required. Appropriate for Music Majors. PREREQUISITE: Audition required. (A, CSU)

Course Objectives

In the process of completing this course, students will:

- 1. Perform with accurate rhythm, pitch, and intonation.
- 2. Perform with appropriate articulation, dynamics, phrasing, and expression.
- 3. Demonstrate performance practice according to the style, culture, and time period of the repertoire.

- 4. Demonstrate blend, balance, and musical communication when performing with an accompanist.
- 5. Critically analyze and discuss musical performances making informed value judgments.
- 6. Perform intermediate/advanced-level solos and ensembles from various cultures, styles, and historical periods.
- 7. Perform scales, arpeggios, studies, exercises, and sight reading examples.
- 8. Exhibit poise and musicality in public performances including student and department recitals, master classes, competitions, and events sponsored by other colleges, universities and associations.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Perform intermediate/advanced-level repertoire from a breadth of styles, cultures, and historical periods with technical accuracy and artistic sensitivity.
- 2. Perform scales, arpeggios, studies, exercises, sight reading examples, solos, and ensembles with precision.
- 3. Give, receive, and apply constructive feedback regarding musical performance.
- 4. Write critically, use correct terminology, and synthesize concepts about music performance.

Required Materials

- 1. Appropriate musical instrument. Some instruments are available for loan.
- 2. Appropriate musical literature and method book for your instrument (any music supplied by the instructor to be returned at the end of the semester)
- 3. Selected readings and excerpts for study

Assignments

Students will complete weekly masterclass and practice assignments based on their lesson progress. Assignments of scales, exercises, études and solo repertoire will be made on an individual basis appropriate to each student's level of ability. Students will perform in at least one student recital and a performance jury each semester. Students are expected to practice and come prepared for their lessons. Regular practice outside of lessons is required and necessary for progress on your instrument. Students may be required to keep a weekly log of their practice session times and content.

Grading Criteria

Every student will participate in masterclass and weekly private lessons (music majors only).

Grading will be based on:

- Quality and thoroughness of weekly preparation
- Consistency of preparation and progress
- Quality and quantity of technical material covered
- Quality and quantity of repertoire covered
- Contribution to masterclass performances, reflections, and feedback

Absences from performances will result in an F for the course. Three tardies constitute an absence. A tardy in excess of 20 minutes is considered an absence.

If an unavoidable conflict arises with a lesson time, please contact the instructor as soon as possible. Absences from lessons must be cleared with the instructor at least 24 hours before the scheduled lesson to be considered excused, except in the case of illness or emergencies. Makeup lessons for excused absences are at the instructor's discretion. Unexcused absences from lessons will result in a failing grade for that week's lesson. After 2 absences, the student will have mandatory advising to discuss their commitment to the Applied Program as a Music Major and the instructor reserves the right to drop the student from the class.
