COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will cover theories and techniques of public speaking. The course is designed to enhance fundamental public speaking skills which include research, organization, reasoning, listening and audience demographics. Particular emphasis will be on the logical organization, composition and delivery of informative and persuasive speeches. Communication 1 fulfills the General Education Requirement in Oral Communication (G.E. Foundation A1).

COURSE OBJECTIVES

In the process of completing this course, students will:

1. Analyze and adapt messages to address audience attitudes, needs and demographics.

2. Develop skill in informative, persuasive and ceremonial speaking.

3. Recognize the role of culture in the production and management of spoken interaction.

4. Present a variety of speeches and will be expected to present for approximately 25 minutes each during the course of the semester.

5. Gain an understanding of the communicative process.

6. Use supporting materials effectively.

7. Develop skill in extemporaneous speaking, students will present a minimum of three graded speeches in front of an audience.

8. Improve listening skills.

9. Recognize the need for clear and concise organization of ideas.

10. Gain communicative competence and confidence as a result of the preparation, presentation, and analysis of oral messages.

11. Utilize practical assignments and exercises that will reinforce the theoretical concepts studied in class.

12. Enhance vocal skills (projection, diction, inflection and volume).

13. Critique and analyze their own and other speeches.

You can make-up speeches with a deduction of points; deductions begin with half a letter grade and goes up from there. Also, if you have not presented your speech (speech#1) before the next round of speeches (speech#2), you will receive zero for the assignment.

Quiz Questions

There will be three examinations. The first exam will cover chapters 1-5. The second exam will cover chapters 6-10. The third exam will cover chapters 11-15. Each exam will consist of twenty multiple-choice questions at three points each. Quizzes will be online and will be open for 24hrs. If I have to reopen a quiz for you, points will be deducted, and no quiz will be reopened past three days/nights from the closing date.

Critique (Professional Analysis Paper)

You will type a one-page paper comparing in-class presentations to an outside, real-world presentation. I recommend TED Talks on YouTube.

Total=40

Peer Evaluation

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There is a total of four (4) presentations. You are <u>required</u> to be an audience member for each speech day (12 days in total) so that you can provide comments for each presenter. Your feedback will be verbal as well as written. You may miss 2 speech days but NOT your own (10x28=280).
